The students really enjoyed it and began to pick up the skills very quickly. Popularity grew and this year more students joined. With training taking a much more improved level, the students soon enough turned into a proper GAA team. Being a member of the Marist Rangers GAA Club, Mr Bacon thought it would be a great opportunity for the Manurewa Intermediate GAA team to experience a proper training session and a match with members of the Marist Rangers Club. In exchange for their help, the Marist members would get to experience a Pōwhiri (Māori welcoming ceremony) and the school Haka. The day was a huge success, with 18 members of the Marist Rangers GAA club being welcomed onto the school grounds through a Pōwhiri (a Maori welcoming ceremony that involves songs and speeches). The students made a welcome speech and sang a song. Padraic did a Mihi (speech) in Te reo Māori and Irish followed by the Marist Rangers singing the traditional Irish song Oró Sé do Bheatha 'Bhaile. The Marist Rangers were really

impressed when the students performed their School Haka in front of them. Once the cultural formalities had taken place, both Marist and the M.I. students were getting excited to see some GAA action with many questions from the students on the run up to the upcoming training session.

#### Training and a Big Game


