

AN OPEN LETTER TO WHĀNAU/ AIGA

2nd February 2026

Greetings, Kia Ora, Fakaalofa lahi atu, Malo e lelei, Talofa lava, Aloha, Kia Orana, Ni Hao, Buenos Dias, Ciao, Malo ni, Habari Dobor Dan, Namaste, Salaam....

AND so, with a bottomless supply of optimism, I am excited, and I hope you are too, about the possibilities 2026 will bring for your child here at Manurewa Intermediate, by being at school every day!

I am writing on the first day of the new 2026 school year to welcome you and your whānau to another year of involvement with Manurewa Intermediate School, or if this is your first involvement with us, to especially welcome you to our community! I would also like to use this opportunity to inform you all of a number of things and to let you know right from the outset that we want AND actively encourage your support, ideas and skills to help make Manurewa Intermediate School the very best it can be as we continue the focus we have had the last seventeen years, of increasing student engagement, increasing student presence, increasing student involvement and ultimately increasing student achievement; with our vision to develop our students into '*adventurous risk takers; with persistent focussed achievement*'. However, to do this it is important that you are involved! I also ask you to spend time with, and on your kids! Do you play with your children? Do you lose track of time with your children? One way you can do so is when you are playing and laughing and communicating with them – they need your time and love and I urge you to exert some on them.

AND, it is important for whānau to know, education doesn't start at the classroom door - it begins long before that, at home. The habits, attitudes, and values instilled in children shape their approach to learning and their ability to contribute to a positive classroom environment. A student who listens, respects others, and values education isn't just easier to teach, they create a better space for everyone to learn. When children are taught responsibility, curiosity, and kindness early on, they don't just show up prepared; they show up ready to grow. AND that starts at home with great parenting!

If we want to truly support teachers, the best place to start is by raising students who are prepared to learn, respect their role in the classroom, and understand the value of education. Our staff work hard for your kids, but to do the very best we can do we need all your support and involvement as well, so that ultimately our children will be the recipients of a relevant, well balanced and productive education which will ensure they feel happy, secure and successful! I also believe that the learning process must be exciting, fun, and motivating for all children! This will be a real focus in our school, coupled with academic excellence – happy, interested, and motivated children are successful children, and this means they are attending every day and learning!

The education of your child really IS a two-way process and by working together, we can make a difference! The staff for our part will be working very hard to meet the needs of your child and your assistance and interest is encouraged and needed – making sure, they are at school every single day, on time, ready and prepped by 8.20am for an 8.30am start! Positive relationships with teachers and other students are critical – this is an area that we are continually looking at, as we know when your child likes their teachers, likes their class, and have good friendships then they are ready to be the learner they need to, and can be. It is all our responsibility, including yours, to constantly work hard at addressing the needs of our kids in all ways. Therefore, I invite you to dig into the huge mixture of things on offer for your child and whānau and to get involved throughout the year and I encourage you to drag every gram of enjoyment from these experiences and events. Your involvement makes a big difference to your child's attitude towards school, and ultimately their achievement!

That does not mean it is easy though. We know this. Some days we really are not in the mood... and that is okay. Be kind to yourself – but at the end of the day your child **needs** to be at school – at school every single day, unless they are sick, and it is important we are all as strong and resilient as possible. So, let your own resilience inspire you to get your children to school, and on time, because you can do this, and this prompt start now will give your child the best chance of ongoing success at school all year. If you are finding it tough to get your child to school contact us, or if your whānau need any support from us here at school around anything, including your child's mental wellbeing, happiness and motivation, or your own and/or wider whānau wellbeing then do not hesitate to contact us and we will try to help! In the first instance, contact can be made with Lois Hawley-Simmonds, our Poutoko Hapori: Community Engagement Coordinator (a vital professional learning connection between home and school that our board funded last year) or any other pastoral care staff you feel comfortable with. All these people and their roles and contact details are listed on the attached flyer.

I encourage your feedback on what we do, and we are open to your opinions or ideas. Over the course of the next few weeks, it is my intention that you will become familiar with all that we do through face-to-face events, newsletters, Facebook, Instagram, the MI Night Market, and perhaps our very best public relations people – your tamariki, who are **always** our best PR!!

Thank you for taking the time to read what I know is a rather lengthy letter, but a dialogue that I believe is vital in ensuring you know exactly what is going on for your child, and for ensuring our school is seen in a positive light by celebrating all the events, achievements and experiences our children have had the past five weeks. This dialogue between home and school will always continue to be frequent, extensive and, I hope, interesting. Look out for the first full school newsletter, '*Manurewa Monthly*' in week 5, on Thursday 5th March, and which will continue to come home in week 5 and 9 or 10 of each term. In each newsletter, there will be information about the next month, general information and notices, affirmations, class reports or samples of work, event reports, general school reminders and community notices. This next full newsletter on 5th March will have all details about class teachers and rooms, and the various programmes operating. There is a fair bit of information coming home over the next few days, so I urge you to check in with your child each afternoon! Your child also gets their full free stationery this week, as well as the personal individual one-to-one use of a laptop every day in school, so I trust you are appreciative of these being provided for free from the school! In lieu of all this support to your whānau, we really hope you will be regularly involved in all that goes on at school, as we also do not charge for camps, zone sports comps or school-wide trips. And in addition to all this your child is provided with a fresh lunch every single day so there is no need to make their lunch from home or drop off an expensive bakery or a local or international takeaway store (read: KFC or McD's!!) bought lunch during the day! However, a substantial morning tea snack is a good idea as our lunch time is a bit later than what most students are used to, starting at 1.25pm.

For now, I enclose a copy of the **Year's Calendar**, which I suggest you stick to your fridge immediately! Whilst it is not a definitive list of all that is happening over the year it does include all things as known today. If there are any new events, these will be advised well in advance via the newsletter and Facebook. Also attached is a reminder about the uniform standards and a flyer inviting you to our 'South Auckland famous' "**MI Night Market**", which is on in week 2, NEXT WEDNESDAY (11th February) 4pm – 6.30pm on the school field. This is another opportunity to meet your child's form teacher if you did not do so on MI Whānau Day.

We hope the activities at the start of the year will be the beginning of beneficial relationships between the home and school, and we continue these face-to-face relationships in Term 1 with our Student Involved Conferences in week 9, on Tuesday 31st March. Details will come out closer to the date, but for now keep some time aside that day so you can attend these very important conferences with your child. These start at 8am and end at 8pm, and every parent/caregiver can book a time slot in that time span for 20 minutes. See you there!

Compulsory School-Wide Event Attendance
